Following the AGM, members and guests enjoyed a brief chat with a glass of wine or a cup of tea or coffee, while waiting for Jim Asher's talk which followed shortly afterwards (*see page 2*).

## OUR FIRST TALK IN THE MARCHAM CENTRE

### Report on: "*Butterflies, Marcham and Lockdown*" by Jim Asher

The Marcham Society were delighted to welcome their members in the village hall for the first time on Monday the 27<sup>th</sup> of September. This was notable for two reasons. It was the first time the village hall had been used by the Society and the first time since March 23<sup>rd</sup> 2020 (the Lockdown) that the Society's members had been able to congregate for one of their regular meetings.

The talks had been held over Zoom in the preceding months with the Marcham Society being one of the first of the local societies to offer this. It proved so successful that the committee decided that, on returning to physical meetings, it would be a good idea to continue to run a Zoom session in parallel, so that the more remote members, or those that felt unable to be in the hall, were still able to participate. I am pleased to say that the evening was a great success, in terms of attendance, technology working the way it should (!) and the talk given by Jim Asher.

Jim framed his talk using the background of changed circumstances due to the coronavirus. He took us on a photographic tour of both the skies and planets above us to the tiniest of insects on the ground around us, with everything in between (including us as human beings) over the time period of February 2020 to the present day. Speaking as one of the remote attendees I was able to savour the quite remarkable photography that Jim presented us with, being both projected in the hall and on my laptop screen at home. This sometimes took my breath away; my particular favourite was a picture of a Red Kite in flight near Jim's home. (*top left picture*)


In days past strange phenomena from the heavens were seen as portents of bad things and whether coincidentally or not (considering our current circumstances with the pandemic) Jim captured in photographs a partial solar eclipse in June 2020 a near conjunction of the planets Jupiter and Venus in December 2020 (*top right picture*) and the comet Neowise on its path through the night sky.

At the other end of the scale Jim's skills as a photographer and a naturalist were evident in the pictures of the butterfly's lifecycle, from eggs, caterpillars, pupae to the beauty of the final form. In between there were pictures of wildlife that emerged when humans were locked away and indeed also of human beings changing their behaviour emerging from their bunkers on a Thursday evening to 'clap for the NHS', as well as Denise, Jim's wife, playing Hop Sckotch (sic.) in the deserted roadway of the 'Gap'. The attendance in the hall was over fifty members and there were more than ten remote attendees as well, marking this beginning of the new era for Marcham Society as one of great success. All involved are to be congratulated for providing us with both superb content in the hall and in our homes.
