


The April Mid-Week Walk

THE MEMBERS EVENING IN THE MARCHAM CENTRE

The Members Evening started with '*The Marcham Society Archives*' a talk by Sheila Tilley. Sheila explained the purpose of the archive and she gave examples of interesting items that it contains. Sheila Dunford followed with a talk '*Using the Archives*' and she showed how the information about Marcham held in the archives could be used for research and answer questions about the village and its inhabitants in the past. In both talks, the members were encouraged to help maintain the Archives and even do their own personal research.


The half time break gave members the opportunity to chat over refreshments and eat delicious homemade cakes. At the same time there was a rolling projection of 500 of the Society's photographic archive that gave rise to much comment and conversation.

The evening ended with a third talk entitled 'Roman Coins from Southern Oxfordshire' given by Simon Blackmore. Simon talked about the many finds of coins recorded on the 'Portal Antiquities Scheme'. He gave details of the Didcot and Chalgrove Hoards as well as the coins found at Roman sites at Dorchester on Thames and Marcham, both of which were excavated under the auspices of Oxford University with the help of local volunteers.

The evening was well attended with over fifty people in the hall and a dozen on line via Zoom.

Discovered in 2003 and now it is on display in the **Ashmolean Museum**.

4,957 bronze coins were found in a pot. Some were 'silvered' but all dating from AD 251-279 - a time of crisis between AD 200 and 300 when central control was lost.

The 'Gallic Empire' broke away from Rome and was ruled by Postumus, Victorinus and Tretricus.


THE GALLIC EMPERORS The images of the emperors are very alike with their rays-of-the-sun crowns (radiates), longish hair and flowing beards. Only the young Tetricus II is unbearded.
