
The May Mid-Week Walk

THE MAY TALK IN THE MARCHAM CENTRE

Julie Ann Godson had to postpone her talk on 'Scandals in High Society Oxfordshire' on health grounds and at the last minute our ex-Chairman Peter Steere gave us an alternative presentation. This was an update on his DPhil studies which he entitled:

"Limiting Infectious Disease in Late 19th Century Berkshire. Necessary Intervention or Unwarranted Intrusion?"

Peter highlighted the problems of disease, health care and quarantine in Victorian times and he helped us draw parallels with the present Covid pandemic, not least government imposed restrictions and public concern over infection.

The questions at the end of his forty minutes showed how much interest there was in the subject. Jim Asher away in Scotland asked about the comparative state of medical awareness in Europe and Bartle Frere wondered if any politicians at the time were caught breaking their own regulations!

The talk was well attended with over thirty people in the hall and sixteen on line via Zoom. It was good to welcome Peter back and to show him the Marcham Centre in action.

He described other 19th century isolation units that were not quite so comfortable!




THE OUTING TO OXFORD BOTANIC GARDEN

A group of Marcham Society Members met at the Oxford Botanic Garden (OBG) on Thursday 26th May and they were welcomed by Clare, one of the volunteer guides of the OBG. She explained the history of the gardens and then she started her tour. The first thing she presented was the new hybrid, the 'Oxford Physic Rose', created to mark OBG's 400th anniversary.

Other features she highlighted were the 'Screaming' Mandrake (*Mandragora Officinarum*), the Black Pine (*Pinus Nigra*) and a new bed of Parasitic Plants (including *Orobanche minor*). The Black Pine was Tolkien's favourite tree and she also alluded to Philip Pullman's *Northern Lights* and she even showed us Lewis Carol's Cheshire Cat hidden in a tree! There were also beds of botanics for gin production and a new area set aside for Mediterranean plants.

After she finished her tour, the glass houses and their exotic plants awaited before leaving for a welcome cup of tea and cakes in a café on the High Street!
