# Marcham Society Outing : A guided tour of the Harcourt Arboretum in Nuneham Courtenay



In 1947, the University of Oxford purchased the Harcourt estate and created an arboretum that has grown over time to 130 acres. It was acquired by the Botanic Garden in 1963. It was designed as a place of beauty, to preserve the collection of North American conifers, and to grow trees for which the Oxford Botanic Garden was too small or the soil too alkaline.

Today, visitors can discover trees from around the world, such as dawn redwoods, growing alongside tranquil British woodland and open meadows.

### "The Making of the Marcham Centre Sign" by Suzanne O'Driscoll

Monday 26<sup>th</sup> September 2022

Suzanne O'Driscoll is a British artist who is both a painter and a designer of large-scale sculpture for public art commissions across the world. In 2020 Suzanne was selected by Marcham Community Group to design and fabricate the new Marcham Centre sign and this was unveiled in November 2021. It now stands proudly near the entrance to welcome visitors to our village Centre. It was therefore a pleasure to welcome Suzanne to Marcham Centre to hear about her work.

#### Public Art Installations

Suzanne explained how researching and piecing together visual imagery is part of the process in working towards and creating a final design which is then fabricated and installed. Suzanne regularly works with DMS Laser fabricators who bring her designs to life using stainless steel panels and laser cutting techniques.

After brief and enticing views of some of her early paintings, Suzanne took us on a journey through the large variety of the installations she has completed in recent years. Starting with the Ventura P&O Cruise liner, Oasis Spa in 2007 which crucially had to have bolts installed for the installation during the building of the new ship, we learned about the visual design components Suzanne worked on before bringing them together, seemingly effortlessly, to form an item of beauty.



This was a theme of Suzanne's talk; she showed us the early sketches for each piece and then how she worked it all up to complete the final designs (listed here because you may like to look them up). They are all visually stunning and beautiful in every detail.

Meadow Gardens, North Oxford 2009; Lascar Works, Hounslow, London 2009; Bryan House Commission, Bicester 2012; St Lukes Yard, Queens Park, London 2013; Kingsmere Community Centre, Bicester 2018; Abbey Meadows outdoor swimming pool, Abingdon 2018; Collins St. Cowley Oxford 2019; Chainhill Cemetery, Wantage 2020 and then perhaps the most poignant of all Didcot A Power Station, Didcot Civic Hall, 2019, 'Fragility and Strength' and Resilience and Memory were made to remember the four men who lost their lives during the demolition of Didcot A Power Station and a third piece 'Celebration and History' which acknowledges and celebrates the 40 years history of the site.

'Celebration and History'

Suzanne described this piece as follows:

'This artwork celebrates the history of Didcot A power Station. The station generated electricity from 1970 – 2013. Through the years it became an important part of the town and community, as well as an unforgettable landmark in the countryside. The design takes a birds-eye view of the site, depicting the key industrial elements and extensive network of roads, pipes and rail tracks. The artists intention in the three works is to create an individual interpretation of the site, that accentuates themes of history and memory.'

Then Suzanne brought our attention to the Marcham Centre sign; the brief, describing the team who came together to manage the project and most importantly presenting the visual components which together incorporate the history and culture of Marcham as well as several village activities into the completed sign.



The presentation that accompanied Suzanne talk was rich with images of her finished pieces which enhance so many different environments locally and further afield. We await future projects that Suzanne undertakes with anticipation.
