# Visit to the Aston Martin Heritage Museum Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> November 2024 at 10.30am





More than 110 years of Aston Martin history is waiting for you at the Aston Martin Heritage Museum at Drayton St Leonard near Berinsfield.

The vehicle collection ranges from A3 - the oldest surviving Aston Martin in the world - through definitive models from every era to cars of today. Among Sir Stirling Moss's overalls and trophies from the heyday of Aston Martin Racing, you will be immersed in the automotive story of one of the most famous marques in British history. The tour will take about an hour and a half.

**Directions**: To find the museum take the Wimblestraw Rd off the A4074 which becomes Burcot Lane and then Dorchester Road and as you pass the village sign "Drayton St Leonard" turn right and carry on to the very end of the road.

**Lunch :** We hope to follow the visit with lunch at The Wandering Kitchen Cafe which is located on Burcot Lane by Queenford Lakes, about a mile from the museum. 

#### "Conflict and good living: excavations at Besselsleigh" a talk by Jane Harrison

Monday 25th November 2024 at 7.15 for 7.45pm in the Main Hall, Marcham Centre, Barrow Close, OX13 6TY

Jane Harrison is an Early Medieval specialist and fieldwork director who has run excavations across Britain. She has taught at Oxford University's Department for Continuing Education, worked with Newcastle University, published widely and most recently excavated on Hadrian's Wall, and sites in Oxfordshire and North Northumberland.

This talk will discuss the deserted Besselsleigh Manor and village site in its wider Oxfordshire context. Besselsleigh is a great example of a place we now overlook that was once of considerable local significance.

Now a peaceful parkland area, the site was occupied from the Roman age to the nineteenth century and continuously from the Anglo-Saxon period. Over the years it saw advances in comfortable living, park design and women's education, as well as playing host to some important visitors and a significant role in the English Civil War.






#### The Astronomy Group met on Thursday 17th October

### "Fungi of Oxfordshire's Golden Triangle"

A talk by Judy Webb given on Monday 28th October



Judy Webb is a local ecologist who has been fascinated by fungi for many years and leads surveys for the *Fungus Survey of Oxfordshire* which is a local group who love fungi and are concerned with recording fungal species for conservation purposes.

Fungi come in a multitude of forms; from mushrooms, toadstools, brackets and boletes to puffballs, stinkhorns, coral fungi, rusts, smuts and mildews. Many are essential to plant and tree growth, some cause disease, many are important in decay and re-cycling. All sorts in many colourful forms are to be found in the exceptionally wildlife-rich area on the Jurassic Corallian sands of the Marcham - Cothill - Frilford area, *the 'golden triangle'*.


# 'CORAL RAG'

Coral Rag is the Journal of the Marcham Society and its name is taken from the local coral rag-stone (Corallian limestone) on which Marcham stands. To quote Eric Dunford who wrote the foreword of the first volume in 2001:

"This title was chosen to show that we want to contain some lighter material as well as the more serious reports, but it also draws attention to the fact that our whole environment is based on the Corallian rocks beneath our feet and that most of our old buildings are made of this 'rag' stone."

Since then there have been another eleven volumes published with a variety of articles covering Archaeology, Natural History, History and many other topics that relate to the parish of Marcham and the surrounding countryside.

Most of these past volumes are still available in the Village Shop or from Sheila Tilley at our regular meetings.


